


Mission


Strategic Objective 1: Optimise the quality and effectiveness of country & regional programming


Strategic Objective 1: continued...

- **63% (49) of the targeted number** (78) of Technical Assistance has been provided to countries.
- **11 Technical Assistance** have been provided to the Regional Alliances (SADC, MOSASWA, E8, ECCAS, WAHO).
- The Technical Assistance provided has **focused on addressing the COVID-19 associated bottlenecks, National Malaria Strategic Plan Development, Malaria Programme Reviews, Global Fund Applications**, etc.
- A joint **evaluation (WHO & RBM Partnership) of the HBHI approach** is currently ongoing.

The Impact of the TAs

- Align malaria planning with the broader health and development agenda, and support to mobilize resource at country and regional levels.
- Opportunity to incorporate a mix of new tools and best practices, including strategy to ensure access to everyone.
- Enable countries to design policies, set new targets and improve their coordination systems, including incorporation of CRG programming.
- Mainstream malaria in the agenda of the regional economic communities including at Head of State, minister and technical level.
- Support has helped to mitigate against the impact of COVID-19.

Strategic Objective 2: Maximise levels of financing

Supporting the Global Fund Replenishment Campaign:

- **Amplifying the Global Fund investment case** – Malaria-specific case studies, thematic narratives and advocacy arguments demonstrating impact of Global Fund investments have been developed for use by RBM Partners
- **Leveraging key moments to increase support for the Global Fund**
 - World Malaria Day high-level event and Partner messaging
 - World Malaria Day Francophone event with OIF, WHO, GF, Africa CDC
 - CHOGM 2022 Kigali Summit on Malaria and NTDs thought leadership
- **Elevating malaria and CSO voices throughout campaign**
 - Contributing malaria messaging and champions to three disease community advocacy efforts
 - Participating in cross-community Partner roundtables
- **Francophonie engagement**
 - World Malaria Day Francophone event with key partners


Support Countries to fill financial gaps:

- Provide TA to countries and regional entities in financial and programmatic gap analysis - 95% of highly and moderately endemic countries mobilised sufficient resources to cover their LLIN, IRS, SMC and case management gaps in 2022

Strategic Objective 2: continue...

Partner Coordination and Support:

- **Continued XPC leadership to align** Partnership activities in support of the Global Fund Replenishment
- **Bridging the malaria community and the three-disease community** through coordination with the Global Fund, GFAN, and the Friends Network
- **Compiling, publishing, and escalating to donors the Countries' Programmatic & Financial GAPS** through:
 - the Global Malaria Dashboards,
 - CRSPC bi-weekly calls and
 - Data Initiative quarterly calls



Strategic Objective 3: Facilitate the deployment and scale-up of new products, techniques or implementation strategies

- Subnational tailoring has contributed to this scale up of new tools
- Approval of GF catalytic investments (2024-26) including new products
- We are working with GAVI and other Partners to support malaria vaccine targeting

Priorities for the next months

- CRSPC sub-regional malaria programmes and partners meetings
- UN General Assembly (September 2022)
- Global Fund replenishment (September 2022)
- Support countries in GF Funding Request in 2023
 - To ensure timely submission of high quality funding proposals and to avoid gaps in implementation, the CRSPC will provide a comprehensive package of support to countries, based on a tried and tested country-led approach
 - GF Funding Application Orientation meeting to inform countries on the differentiated application approach and prepare detailed TA plans. (December 2022)
 - International consultants provide TA to support the development of the funding applications and background documents such as gap analysis, address TRP comments, MPR/NSP.
 - Funds to countries to support in-country consultations, country dialogue and recruitment of local consultants.
 - Mock TRP meetings will be held to facilitate country peer review of draft applications.
 - Remote expert review of final draft funding applications will be provided by CRSPC members
 - Support is planned to assist countries to achieve timely grant signature (Grant making).
