



SP4 will use additional investment to help support a malaria and agriculture project that focuses on improving the impact that increase farming practices (rice) has on mosquito breeding/ malaria transmission



Malaria and Education Project (TBD)

SP4 will use additional investment to support a malaria and education project that will improve knowledge and access and use of malaria prevention and treatment commodities among school aged children
